2015 Bond Plan

- Developed by the Citizen's Bond Development Committee
- Monitored by the Citizen's Oversight Committee
- Continuation of a 20-year comprehensive plan that began in 1995-96
- Tax rate will remain level
- Consists of four categories
 - Facilities
 - Libraries
 - Classrooms
 - Transportation

2015 Bond Overview

- \$415 million bond proposal (6 years)
- 60% required to pass
- Affects home values, neighborhoods and economic development
- Vote March 3, 2015



Public/Community Survey

- Decrease trailer/modular classrooms: 76.5 % are in favor of reducing the number of portable facilities and building permanent classroom additions. TPS currently has 140 trailer/modular.
- Student access to technology: 73.2 % support funding technology to provide *every* student in the district with individual access to a computer, laptop or tablet.
- New schools: 64.8 % support building of new elementary schools in communities experiencing extreme growth.
- Centralized STEM Center: 63.1 % favor of TPS investing in STEM and a centralized STEM facility for all students.
- Elementary school downtown: 52.9 % support creating a school designed to serve downtown residents and the children of commuters who work downtown.

Building Improvements

- Roof replacement:

- HVAC work (13 sites): \$23.5m
- Restroom upgrades:
 \$2m
- Accessibility upgrades: \$1.5m
- Playground equipment:

- Plumbing, paving, service vehicles, windows, etc.
- CNG infrastructure upgrade for transportation

Libraries: \$19.8m

- New digital and print library books @ \$26 per pupil annually: \$6.25m
- Licenses for online research materials for students to access <u>from home and school</u>: \$2.2m

Smart Start: Bridging the Digital Divide

Teacher Survey Results:

- 86.9% Important students have access to a computing device all or most of the time.
- 72.2% Important to have 1:1 access
- 84.1% Technology has an important impact on achievement
- 73.3% Important to have home access





Classroom Learning Tools

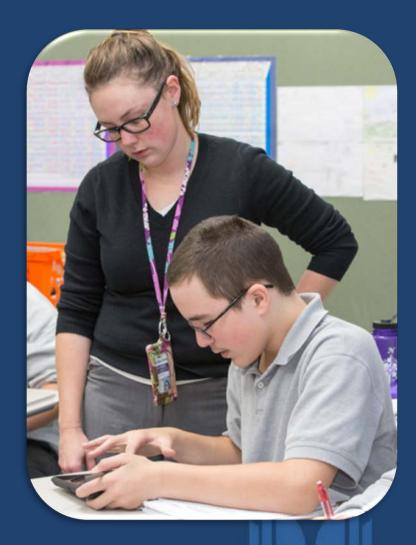
- Computers and tablets for student use @ \$148 per student annually: \$39.5m
 Goal: 1:1 device/student
- 21st Century teaching tools: \$14m
 - Interactive display boards
 - Classroom audio systems 1,500 classrooms





Classroom Learning Tools

- New digital and print textbooks @ \$50 per student annually: \$12.45m
- Instructional resources: \$5.7m
 - Credit recovery/online
 - Instructional video system
 - Teaching resources



Technology Infrastructure

Approximately \$35 million

- District network upgrades: \$16.75m
- Wide area network improvements: \$7.5m
- Application virtualization to support BYOD: \$5.6m
- Managed Print Services:
 \$3.7m



Classrooms



- Curriculum materials including STEM: \$8.5m
- Science lab and safety equipment: \$800,000
- Professional development systems: \$1.5m

Classrooms



- Visual and performing arts equipment: \$2.6m
- Secondary school auditoriums: lighting/rigging: \$2.75m
- Physical education equipment: \$750,000
- Classroom furniture: \$4.1m

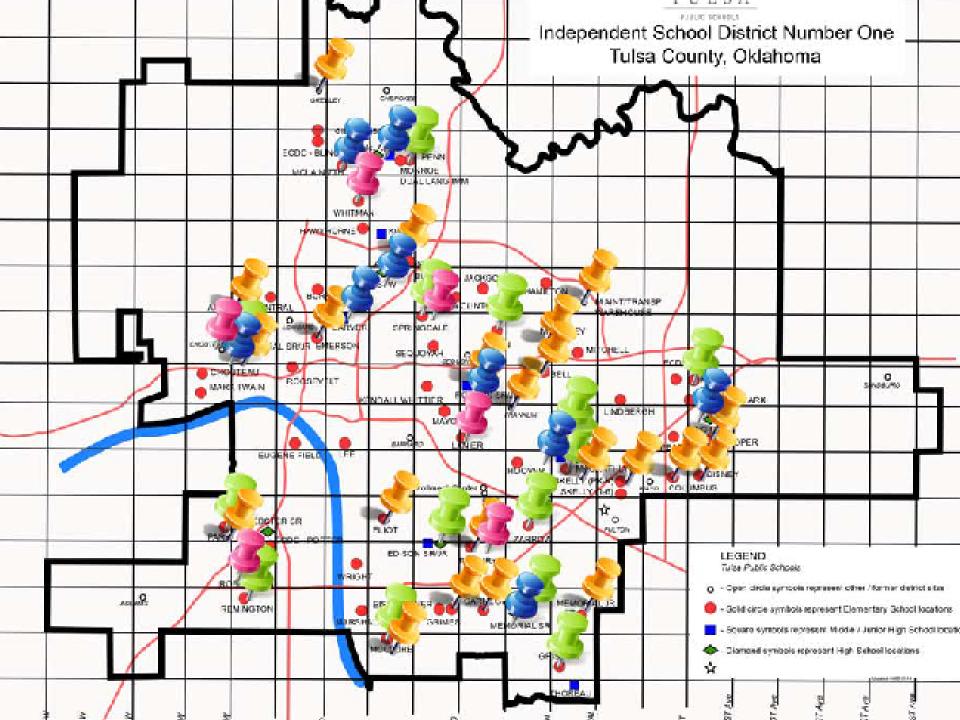

Transportation



\$17,025,000

- Replaces 20 school buses each year
- Maintains 12-year life cycle of school buses
